In our experience, once they are able to tell their story, it becomes a whole lot less scary and has a whole lot less power over them; even though it is painful and difficult to tell.

We continue to work toward building an indoor arena that will allow us to offer Equine Gestalt Coaching to the kids in our program. It is our belief that a powerful child, when partnered with a powerful horse and a caring coach, can learn to release themselves from the self-made prison of their own past experiences and negative self-beliefs. For us, this is very exciting as we will be able to offer healing to kids and, if willing, their families in a safe and supportive (and indoor) environment. I would like to thank all of those who supported the building of the arena. We are almost to our goal, but there is still time to give to this important project. Our target is to start offering Equine Gestalt Coaching starting in early 2019.

It seems appropriate to start in 2019, as 2019 is our 75th anniversary. As such, we will be gearing up to celebrate our 75th year of Rekindling Hope in Youth during the first weekend of August 2019. We will be inviting supporters, former staff and former residents to join us for a celebration on our campus in Veguita. So many lives have been impacted by your support and assistance and we can't wait to celebrate. We genuinely hope that you'll join us.

While 75 years seems like an eternity, we are hoping to be helping kids for 75 more years. If we are to be around that long, it will be due to the generosity of you, our donors, and the caring people who choose to rearrange their lives in order to make a difference for "the least of these." I hope you will remain supportive of us and always aware of how much we appreciate you.


Ethnicity of Children Served



Facts About The Ranches

The goal of the New Mexico Boys and Girls Ranch program is to keep families together whenever possible and to reunite families who have experienced separation for a period of time. The program is based on Christian principles and strives to instill values that will provide the children with the skills and qualities they need to live successfully. New Mexico Boys and Girls Ranch does not accept government funding. We depend on donations from individuals, businesses, foundations and churches to subsidize programs for youth and their families who need assistance navigating the difficult teenage years. Contributions are tax deductible.

- Residential programs provide a family-style atmosphere that gives youth the opportunity to develop the social, emotional and educational skills needed to move forward. We provide services to children and families regardless of religion, ethnic background or financial situation. We have the capacity for 38 young people at the New Mexico Boys and Girls Ranch.
- New Mexico Boys and Girls Ranch is not a residential treatment center, a detention facility or an emergency-placement shelter.
- Inquiries for admission to our programs come from relatives, schools, friends, juvenile courts and social welfare agencies. Children are not forced to participate in our programs, but before coming to The Ranch, applicants must be willing to commit to making changes in their behavior while they are in the program.
- Parents or guardians of the residents are expected to participate in classes using The Ranches' "Your Family Matters" curriculum. These classes are offered to all interested adults as well. The course teaches practical tools to increase effectiveness, promote resiliency, and help children increase achievement, motivation and discipline.
- Through Families for Children, caring foster families give young children (infants to age 17) a safe place to live. These children are better served in a more intimate setting rather than a residential group home atmosphere. Families for Children is licensed by the New Mexico Children, Youth and Families Department as an adoption and foster care agency. All foster homes are licensed by our agency, and are closely monitored by staff.
