Accountability Without Self-Awareness

"You gotta resurrect the deep pain within you and give it a place to live that's not within your body.

Let it live in art. Let it live in writing.

Let it live in music. Let it be devoured by building brighter connections.

Your body is not a coffin for pain to be buried in. Put it somewhere else." ~ Ehime Era

While some of you may appreciate the quote and some may prefer your quotes to come only through inspiration from above, I still believe, as the song says, "He's got the whole world in His hands." Therefore, the origin of the quote is less relevant to me than the corresponding truth within it.

Since we're on the subject of truth, another truth is that we often prefer our young people to be seen rather than heard. While I understand it, I just don't see any significant or positive outcomes from allowing children to suffer in silence.

As a result, I work to make this quote a reality all of the time; for me and for the kids who have had their life turned upside down to the point of needing to be at The Ranches.

But what does, "...resurrecting the deep pain within you..." actually look like?

For many kids at The Ranches, it looks a whole like a kid trying to punish themselves for inheriting the darkness of their parents by honoring those parent's actions, behavioral style and life choices. When they reach us, the fertile soil that used to exist in their souls is often covered by the weeds of trauma, self-loathing, insecurity and sometimes even self-harm. So we do what we have always done and we go to work on preparing their soul to again be a field of fertile soil. To do that, we have to help them resurrect the deep pain within them so that we can help them see that pain and themselves differently.

If you believe that no child is born "bad" as I do, then you have to honestly look at the environmental factors in a child's life and work first to understand them before trying to help them understand anything. While it ain't easy work, it is what we do... now.

... "Sunday - Self-Awareness and Accountability"

We often talk about accountability while I am attempting to talk about self-awareness. For me, the two are linked as most adventures in accountability tend to stem from a lack of self-awareness. If you know what needs to be done, and you do it, accountability is far less necessary.

But within relationships, the same principle holds true. If you practice self-awareness, and that leads you to understand how your actions, behaviors and tendencies affect the people around you, accountability within relationships becomes much easier and far less necessary.

For instance, I am aware that I am difficult to deal with and that my tendency towards a "right way" juxtaposed against every other way, can be challenging for people. I also get that I move at a pace that is far too urgent for most. On top of those, I also value a hard truth over whatever made up reason people have to lie and I'd rather be hated for who I am than loved for who I am not. And lastly, I assume that people who work to avoid me and are content to live here without engaging me in meaningful ways are either cowards or less intelligent than your average mule.

I hold myself to these standards so I do not struggle to confront those who are failing to meet them.

But what about kids?

Is your goal for kids best described as accountability for compliance or are you more dedicated to teaching them a lesson in self-awareness each time they fail to meet an expectation of ours?

You see, compliance is just the first step towards an authority figure discovering the limits of the atrocities that they are capable of inflicting on children, or the start of their pathway to evil with kids as the receivers of their control fantasies and dictatorial dreams.

In order for accountability to matter, it has to teach the lesson necessary to avoid repeating the behavior that led to the need for accountability, or it fails to be about the child and only serves the ego of the adult.

"When you act this way..."

And...

"Your behavior is not getting you closer to the result you want. Let me explain how..."

These are both easy intros to a lesson in accountability that takes into account the opportunity to teach some self-awareness along with the accountability lesson. "...

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For years, we were willing to discipline and punish so that we didn't have to understand, but now we know better so we have to do better.

While social media is filled with every armchair expert's version of what we "should" do, I prefer to source my expertise from a slightly more eternal source. What would Jesus actually do?

If I am reading it right, discipleship, compassion, and some honesty that can't be overcome and turned away with anger or tantrums seems to be the best answer that I can find to that question. And so we work to do that as often as we can with kids...of all ages.

Discipleship - Everyone has an internal desire to feel like they are a part of something significant and having someone who cares enough about you to offer discipleship - even when it includes that root word discipline - is so needed for kids of all ages; from 8 to 80.

Compassion - Everyone I've ever met has those moments of imperfection where a little bit of compassion - from friends, family, or even strangers - goes a long way. We all need it sometimes and a little bit tends to go a long way. For the kids at The Ranches, sometimes we are the first in a really long time, to even offer it.

Honesty - We all, at times, love to let those darn commandments escape us and, in turn, defeat us. Honesty is often the easiest to let go of. I mean... it is challenging to always be honest when, "I'm fine" and "it's OK" and "No problem" are just so much easier than, "wow, that hurt" or "I didn't appreciate that" or "I need a minute to be hurt and angry before I can honestly forgive you...but I will honestly forgive you."

...that can't be overcome and turned away with anger or tantrums - and this is where I have seen so many good hearted and well-intentioned Christian folks lose the respect of a child. Most of the time, if you ask a child about their worst behavior and they answer honestly, they are being honest about their behavior being purposeful and intentional. They are often "testing" the adults to see if they can trust them even when they are angry. For kids of all ages, you can't trust who you can't trust, and you find out who you can't trust when you're at your worst and they have to respond; either with their worst or with something different and more mature. Sadly, those adults around them either join them in their worst or they courageously share the love that Jesus so freely offered, and they stop the chain reaction started by someone's worst. "We're all human" is the tired refrain, but we offer it to kids often when we fail them and are yet to have the courage to change our own behavior. For most kids, they need to see and experience something different in order to do something different. This often starts by offering love rather than allowing ourselves to offer our worst to combat their worst.

In order for any of these to be a part of what we do, we first have to do the hard work. And that hard work usually starts with,

And, most importantly, we have to really believe that,
